## **Rotowhio marae and concerts**



Concert times: 10:15am, 12:15pm, 3:15pm, 45 minutes long.

A marae is a tribe's gathering place. Meet at the waharoa (carved archway) for a concert. Tickets are required (purchase at entrance).

## Heketanga-ā-Rangi



This waharoa (entrance) combines traditional stories with contemporary Māori sculpture, based on spiritual guardians of our tribe.

## Pōhutu geyser



Pōhutu is the largest geyser in the southern hemisphere. She erupts once or twice each hour and can reach heights of 30 metres.

## Wānanga (NZMACI schools)



Our schools train students in traditional Māori carving and weaving. Watch students continue the proud traditions of their ancestors.

## Papakura geyser



Although Papakura is currently inactive, she last erupted in September 2015 for a continuous 36 hours.

## Ngāraratuatara cooking pool



This pool is used for Ingo, a unique cooking experience where food is cooked inside boiling water in flax baskets.

## Lake Waikaukau



This lake is named after our ancestor Hātūpatu. It is very acidic, yet birdlife swim in and around these waters.

## Pikirangi village



This reconstructed historic village gives you a feel for how Māori people lived before the arrival of Europeans.
